

Hazardous Communication

This section addresses hazardous communication (HazCom) – employees “right-to-know” in the workplace.

General Application

Based on an employee’s right to be informed as well as taught protocols on any potential health hazards encountered in the workplace, Hazardous Communication (HazCom) affects most all industries. As it stands now, OSHA deems HazCom applies to any and all chemicals an employee can reasonably be expected to come into contact with (including emergency case situations). Employees must be provided the necessary tools and training to protect themselves, both initially and as new hazardous chemicals are introduced.

HazCom Program Requirements

- An explanation of HazCom and what it entails
- Where hazardous chemicals are present, the risks involved & protective protocol
- Location of the chemical inventory, MSDS, written hazard evaluation procedures, and communications program
- Knowledge of labeling systems
- Understanding labels and MSDS,
- Hazardous chemical detection
- Employer contributions/controls

Additional Employer

Training must be comprehensive and specific to individual hazardous types presented (i.e. carcinogen, toxic etc). It is required to train employees/workers for any new type of chemicals presented in the workplace. Employers are responsible for assessing chemicals utilized in the workplace for hazardous issues as well as evaluating employees/workers level of understanding of the hazard communication program.
