

Pandemic After-Effects: Infectious Disease Risk Beyond COVID Picture This

Workers may not realize the severity until symptoms appear, and by then, the damage is already done. Infectious hazards demand consistency, not shortcuts. Proper PPE, hygiene, ventilation, and

staying home when ill are not optional—they are what stand between routine work and serious illness or death.
